Prevention Actions for K-12 Schools and School Districts

Prevention encompasses the actions K-12 schools and school districts can take to stop, avoid, or deter school safety threats or incidents and create safer learning environments. The following tips can serve as a starting point for integrating prevention strategies into a comprehensive school safety program this school year. *Please note this list is not exhaustive and each school community has unique safety considerations.*



Engage parents and students in bullying prevention.

A <u>school safety committee</u> provides a mechanism for K-12 leaders to consider the viewpoints of families and youth in bullying prevention activities and reinforce anti-bullying messages at home.



Provide access to school-based mental health services and community providers. School-based mental health services and tele-health programs reduce barriers to care and provide students with support in familiar and convenient settings.







emergency planning. Putting a multidisciplinary team in place can help schools plan for the unique vulnerabilities that these times of day and events can pose.



School-based lessons can help students develop skills and behaviors to recognize potentially <u>dangerous situations</u> and understand the broader implications of their online actions.



Minimize exposure to common cyber threats.

Keeping <u>software up-to-date</u> and <u>regularly scanning</u> <u>for vulnerabilities</u> across internet-connected assets can help prevent damaging cyberattacks.

Evaluate physical security measures.

A vulnerability assessment can take stock of existing physical security measures and identify potential gaps. Working in coordination with law enforcement can provide greater insight into threats.



Educate students on the dangers of

substance use. Classroom activities and programs can equip students with an understanding of the harmful effects of substance use and empower them to make informed decisions.
